


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LIFE AND SCHOOL READINESS



The 2022-2023 school year was not easy, but progress was made towards normal classroom life. More of our classrooms were in person, Early Head Start and Head Start operated five days a week for the majority of the school year, and Home Based served students and families in-person and virtually.

With classroom closures due to staffing shortages and illness the school year was not without struggles. But, The resilience of our students shines through in the graph below from quarter 1 to quarter 3.

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

At Tri-County Head Start it is our mission to serve the whole family, we do this by supporting, engaging, and educating families. A Family Advocate is assigned to each family to build personal relationships, support them in meeting their needs and helping them identify and achieve goals.

Family Relationships 40% of all families completed the Family Strengths Auge of all families completed an FSA, 96% of them Completed a Family Partnership Agreement (FPA). The FPA is an individualized goal-setting process to help support families. Auge of the families that completed an FPA, 13% of them were able to accomplish their goal in the 2022-2023 program vert.

CLASS - THE CLASSROOM ASSESSMENT SCORING SYSTEM

CLASS is an observation instrument that assesses the quality of teacher-child interactions in center-based preschool classrooms. It monitors three domains of the interactions that support children's learning and development: Emotional Support, Classroom Organization, and Instructional Support. The CLASS scoring system is used in the Federal Monitoring of Head Start classrooms. To ensure impactful child-teacher interactions, Tri-County Head Start has several certified, reliable CLASS observers that, in a typical year, observe and score classrooms to ensure our high-quality expectations and standards are maintained.

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
Young Athletes

Special Olympics Young Athletes is an early childhood play program for children with and without intellectual disabilities, ages 3 to 5. Young Athletes introduces basic sports skills, like running, kicking, and throwing. It provides children of all abilities the same opportunities to advance in core developmental milestones. Children learn how to play with others and develop important skills for learning. They also learn to share, take turns and follow directions. These skills help children in family, community, and school activities.

During 2022-2023, the TCHS Wellness Coordinator conducted Young Athlete inperson sessions with children and staff in 9 classrooms each week. Each session lasted 30-45 minutes. For those classrooms that did not receive weekly in-person instruction, the Wellness Coordinator provided virtual instructions once a month. Each TCHS classroom received a Young Athletes backpack full of equipment to use throughout the school year.

At the beginning of the school year, 300 Young Athletes' home kits were given to TCHS students to take home and keep. These were equipped with supplies to complete the virtual Young Athlete lessons.

At the end of the 2022-2023 program year, every TCHS student received a summer Young Athlete activity bag. This was a total of 400 summer kits.

Tri-County Head Start helps children and families learn and maintain a healthy lifestyle. By supporting healthy families and ensuring children are up-to-date on all immunizations, medical exams, dental exams, and dental treatments. On staff is a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist who helps families, designs our menus, and teaches both children and families about nutrition and creating healthy habits. Our Health Services team helps families keep track of upcoming appointments and due dates and our Family Advocates connect families with health providers in our area.


